In November members and their partners enjoyed the Annual Skittles evening at The White Hart, Wroughton which included a traditional pub supper.


It was a double achievement for the Furber household with Barbara winning the ladies competition and husband Bryn winning the men's prize.



Message from Andrew Kerr, chief executive

Wiltshire Counci

The next four years – the challenges – update

I thought it may be helpful to update on the position we are in and the plans we have for managing this.

We estimated the government reduction in our grant funding would be approximately 25% (£122 million) over the next four years. The Comprehensive Spending Review in October announced cuts of 28.4% so w ew eren't far off.

Our business plan sets out how we will manage this reduction, plus other cost pressures, such as our growing ageing population, will cost us around £100 million. A programme of investment and improvements into our priority services will cost a further £124 million.

We have plans in place to save at least £40 million by next April and we are taking action right now to deliver these plans by implementing a review of our management structures to reduce the number of managers. We are also renegotiating contracts with our biggest suppliers and contractors to reduce costs and we are reviewing our largest services to reduce waste and make improvements.

We have, how ever, been taken aback by the recent new sthat the cuts will be front loaded. This means wew ill need to find another £30 millioniny ear one. This is causing cash flow problems in our financial planning. It does not change the overall savings that we need to find over the next four years, but it does mean we need to find more in year one to balance our budget.

In addition, the government has announced the reduction or removal of ring fenced and specific grants. This is welcome but will also impact on our business planning in a significant way.

We are implementing our plans to deliver £40 million savings by April, but we are now also looking at how we manage the cash flow problem and find an additional £30 million.

There are a number of areas we are considering. This includes slowing down or deferring some of the investments and improvements we plan to make, we will also examine the Area Based Grants and specific grants removal and we are looking at possible solutions to accelerate our plans to make savings - this is likely to include achieving 12% savings from each service area in year one rather than spreading the savings over the four years.

We are considering all the options right now on how we can achieve an additional £30 million savings in next year's budget.

I will keep you updated on how we intend to manage this situation. I want to repeat this is not additional money we need to find over the four years, but the need to find additional savings of around £30 million in year one to avoid a cash flow problem.

Parish Council Corner

The Play Area Project

In 1994 Baydon Parish Council (BPC) purchased the field on the north side of Ermin Street and obtained planning permission in 1998 for recreational use. A separate bank account was set up with £3,000 approx.

In 2007 part of the Parish Field was set up as statutory allotments leaving the east part of the field as grass with some of the Millennium trees. The Village Plan published in 2009 and adopted by BPC called for a play area to be located and equipped. Consultations took place by leaflet and at the 2009 Parish Meeting and the preferred location was the Parish Field. Since then BPC has obtained a new planning permission, ensured the transfer to the PC of the £5000 S106 funds from the Fiveways development and successfully applied for a Playbuilder grant of £15,000 from Wiltshire Council.

Quotations for play equipment were submitted to a Parents Working Group and a public meeting in the Summer this year to seek agreement for the type of equipment for both Juniors and Toddlers. The resultant quotations for the Playbuilder (8-13 Year olds juniors) and Toddlers amount to some £23,000 and orders have been placed with Miracle Ltd, the supplier chosen by BPC.

An application has been made to Lottery Funds for £10,000 required to fund the remaining Junior equipment. Installation is planned to take place over the next few months.

The Parish Council will also consider other improvements to the Parish Field eg. access and a fence in the field along the track side.


The success of the project is in no smallway due to the leadership and persistence shown by the BPC Chairman.



By modern standards, most folk were over-clothed, but then homes were much colder to live in and most cloths, particularly the cheaper ones, were thicker and coarser than those today. Women wore thick flannel underclothing and added shawls, capes and heavy long skirts to their blouses.

Working men wore heavy jackets and coarse corduroy trousers, strapped just below the knee. In rainy weather they tied sacks round their shoulders and waists, but even their heavy hob-nailed boots could not give one tenth of the protection of a pair of Wellingtons today. It is interesting to note that most of the shepherds still wore long smocked frocks - the mark of their job, of which they were immensely proud. In 1905, men's suits 'durable yet elegant' were advertised for 14/- at a local fair.

Family Best Clothes c.1900 Older girls went to school in heavy frocks surmounted by white pinafores; the boys wore knockerbocker suits and it was rare to see one without a patch either on knee or seat. It was difficult to determine the sex of children under four, because they all wore skirts, and their hair was cut short because of the prev alence of lice and ring-worm. Thick, black home-knitted stockings were worn inside boots - buttoned for girls and laced for boys - which were worn till they gaped at the toes.

Harvest Time

Little did they know!

The food of the poorer cottagers was simple, at times scanty and certainly lacking in variety. Yet the basic bulk foods were undoubtedly better in quality and flavour than similar kinds today; they were natural and locally produced.

Bread, at 2d a large loaf, was baked in the stone ovens of the village bakery; potatoes were grown in the 'tater-patch', which occupied the largest portion of every garden; fresh root vegetables from garden or field were in good supply. The stock-pot, mainly sustained by the ever proliferous rabbit, occupied a permanent place on the hob. For some families the killing of a pig, reared in a small sty at the bottom of the garden, provided luxury over Christmas and the New Year.

There were no refinements and very few delicacies. Children were often hungry and sought sustenance from the hedgerows. There was certainly no daily spending on sweets and chocolate at the village shop, despite the fact that 1/2d could buy an ounce of boiled sweets and 1d a sizeable bar of chocolate.

It has already been stressed that wages were incredibly low, but prices too, were on an altogether different plane from today. 'Cassell's Shilling Cookery', dated 1903, gives the following information:

Sirloin 1/1 per lb Rumpsteak 1/6 per lb

Rib beef 1/- per lb Brisket 8d per lb

Liver 5d per lb Eggs were often 1/2d each

Butter7d per lb Cheese 4d per lb Sugar 2d per lb

In September 1907, James Reynolds of Lambourn offered to supply 'a good coal' delivered in Baydon for 26 shillings a ton. In 1910 a 'new kitchen range, with boiler' was supplied to the School House for £2.10s.0d.


BAYDON CIRCA 1900 - A SERIAL HISTORY by the late R J NAISH JP Episode 6 - Farming, Food and Clothing

By popular demand, we're repeating the History of Baydon by Jack Naish which was serialised in Scene many moons ago. With oodles of thanks to Mo Lafford for collecting all of the editions together again.

Baydon was a centre of sheep farming. At lambing time the shepherds lived out on the downs in little shelters close to their flocks. One such habitation was still standing on Peak Hill until a few years ago. It is said that in one year as many as 2000 sheep were sent to Marlborough Fair. It has already been noted that because of their skill and experience a number of local shepherds were sent abroad to establish the sheep rearing industry in remote parts of the Empire.

Livestock of many kinds and breeds were kept and played their part in the economy of the farm. But pride of place went to the horse - the key to transport and motive power. The carter was the most important highest paid worker. He received as much as fifteen shillings perweek and enjoyed many privileges.

Although as late as 1910 harrowing was carried out by a team of oxen on a local farm, horses had long since come into their own. Two horses, guided by the ploughman, worked a single furrow 'lack-head'. Some even used a 'turn-wrest', a type native to southern England since Tudor times. The pace was slow and the strip narrow and days were needed to plough a field which a modern tractor can accomplish in as any hours.



At harvest time the sheaves of ripened corn were stacked into ricks, for every farm had to wait its turn to receive the hired threshing machine, which as driven by a long belt by a steam engine. The days of mechanisation were upon them and many a Baydon child returned home at the end of a day's threshing, smothered and half-choked by the barley dust emitted from the rear of these primitive machines.

Yet the rapid changes there were destined to affect agriculture after the 1914-1918 warwere still not foreseen by most country dwellers. The great Wessex poet and novelist Thomas Hardy wrote at this time:
