




Building Work Starts on the School

Clergy Letters...

Dear All

January brought a very cold start to the year 2010. The branches of the trees outlined in frost and snow were stunning – even if walking on the pavements was treacherous. Someone remarked to me recently that, although virtually marooned at home, it was no bad thing after a busy Christmas season, as it gave them a chance to rest. But at this time of the year do you find yourself hankering

after Spring? I do! I can't wait to see the bulbs and the fresh green of emerging leaves signalling the passing of winter. Spring will see the ending of our "interregnum" and we look forward to a new beginning with the new Team Rector, the Reverend Simon Weeden, when he joins the Whitton Team in April.

During this month of February, the church begins the 6 week journey towards Easter known as Lent. Traditionally it is a time for reflection and self discipline. There will be Lent groups in most of the villages for people to discuss the Christian faith on an informal basis. I like to think of it as a time of preparation or training. Lent is a season of repentance, and renewal, shaking off the old, and preparing to celebrate the most joyous festival in the Christian calendar – Easter - when the full glory of Christ's resurrection brings us fresh hope and joy.

This month also brings Valentine's day, a day for exchanging love messages. One Legend has it that this day has it origins in a Roman martyr who died for refusing to give up his faith in Christ. He left a note for the jailer's daughter who had become his friend – signing it "your Valentine". Whether or not that is true, love is in the air, as we already have 25 Weddings booked for this year. We always welcome enquiries from those who feel drawn to a Church Wedding and would like to explore it further. Occasionally couples renew their wedding vows as I did last year, in the church where my husband and I were married. It is, I believe, a lovely way to give thanks for the love and partnership received in marriage. and at the same time energising for the future we have together.

So February is a time for taking a look at ourselves and our relationships and asking ourselves what we need to do in the future to show our love for God and one another. Do we need to reaffirm our love for each other? Do we need to get rid of the old and start afresh?

And from Tony....

Attending an Orthodox church service whilst on holiday in Cyprus reminded me how uncomfortable it is to be faced with a situation where one doesn't know what's going on, understand what's being said or what one is supposed to do. This was emphasised as the congregation wasn't given any opportunity to participate in the service - no singing hymns, no responses - not even saying amen at the end of a prayer!

If a similar feeling about attending church is inhibiting you or your friends from exploring the Christian faith, there will be opportunity to do so through the House Groups that will meet during Lent to consider and discuss aspects of the Christian faith. Here, everybody can be open to say what they really think, to raise queries or to share experiences. They also offer the opportunity to make or deepen friendships.

In Lent 2010 we've chosen to follow this year's York Course entitled "When I survey ... Christ's cross and ours". According to the Bible, the death of Jesus is not the end of a track - it's the gateway into life. His crucifixion gives rise to many key themes which are explored in the course - the place of silence in a noisy world; despair and hope, a suffering world and the challenge of living as followers of Jesus when Christianity is no longer mainstream.

The course includes recorded contributions from Revd John Bell (Iona Community), General Sir Richard Dannatt (ex Chief of the General Staff) and Dr Christina Baxter (Principal of St John's Theological College, Nottingham). Dr David Hope (former Archbishop of York) introduces the course and Colin Morris (President of the Methodist Conference) provides the Closing Reflection at the end of each session.

We plan to arrange groups in each parish to meet five times during Lent (between Wednesday 17th February and Saturday 3rd April) which will be open to all denominations. Attendance at all five sessions isn't compulsory! 

The village has really come together to support this project - HUGE thanks to everyone!





Marlborough Rural N/East Neighbourhood Policing Team Newsletter

I would like to make everyone aware of our current running priorities for the area.

- Traffic related issues in Baydon -Parents dropping children off at Baydon Primary School are parking inconsiderately and causing an obstruction. This, combined with speeding vehicles in Ermin street directly outside the school, causes danger during school drop off and pick up times.
- Anti-Social Behaviour in Aldbourne specifically Westfield Chase and Whitley playing field areas.





PROPERTY MARKING

Every year police recover thousands of pounds worth of property from the hands of criminals. One of the biggest drawbacks in an investigation is trying to trace the owners of this property. Being able to trace the ownership of the property not only helps the owner to get the property back, but it can also provide evidence that is vital in securing convictions. There are several different ways of marking your property depending on the type of object you want to mark, and modern technology is introducing new and better systems all the time. Before marking any valuable items (those individually identified on your household insurance) check with your insurance company that they are happy for you to do so.

Property Marking Solutions

These solutions are a recent addition to property marking, and contain artificial DNA, UV, Micro dots, or a mixture of two or three of these elements. The clear solution is easily painted onto even small items of property, and the unique code is registered to you individually. Once dry the solution is only visible under UV light. When you have marked your property and registered your contact details on the company's database, this makes the property traceable and identifiable to you and only you.

Ultra Violet Pens

Quick, easy and cheap, marking your property with your postcode and house number with a UV pen is one of the most popular ways of making your property identifiable. However, it is not suitable for small items, such as jewellery, and has to be checked every 12 months as it can fade, especially if exposed to heat or sunshine.

Engraving/Etching

Property can be engraved by using scribing pens, ceramic marking pens or electric hand engravers. Etching applies a unique reference number to your property using a chemical solution and stencil. Both of these methods are permanent and visible and can be used to mark china, glass, bikes (except high performance aluminum frames), lawnmowers, engines and other heavy metal objects.

Stamping/Punching

Parish Council Corner

The PC wishes everyone a Happy New Year.

A quick update:

The Traffic Calming Working Group is working hard to tackle speeding on Ermin Street. Baydon's concern has been accepted as a priority by the neighbourhood policing team. In order to increase awareness of the 30 mph limit new signs and village gates (like those in west Berkshire) will be installed. If awareness does not register then the now periodic radar speed checks will produce the well known consequences.

The Parish Field play area is progressing. A £10,000 grant has been awarded for year 2 (from April) of the Playbuilder scheme. The scheme requires that equipment includes "adventure risk" elements. A parents' Working Group is planned to make sure that preferred equipment, within practical layout and financial limits, is purchased.

Rowan Cockcroft will be co-ordinating the setting up of the Group and will be contacting parents who expressed an interest on the location leaflet and the PC will set out the terms for this group.



The next stages are to obtain draft quotations to enable a planning application to be lodged with Wiltshire Council and then apply for another grant so that equipment for the whole age range expressed at last year's Parish Assembly can be catered for.

This year's Parish Assembly will be held on 23 April. The venue will be advised nearer the time and will depend on progress with the school building work. All Baydon groups are invited to describe their year's activities at the meeting.

The skip will now be available at monthly intervals thanks to a request from the Parish Council. Dates are listed on the web site and in Scene.

After taking up residents' requests a grit bin was placed at the junction of Ermin Street/Manor Lane just before the snow arrived. It must be emphasised the grit is for road/pavement use – not house drives. Co-operation on this matter will enable roads to be made safer.

Occasionally a tricycle or bicycle made its somewhat laborious way, picking up many a vicious flint as it went. The right-of-way of the latter machine was often contested by the older inhabitants, who resented its silent approach and imperious bell-tinkling. It is reliably told how one old worthy, on being startled thus, swept his thick walking stick sideways to send an adventurous cyclist sprawling in the dust.

The cross-roads by the Village Green was, socially, an interesting place to be in. It was a vantage point at which to while away a summer evening - if you weren't at work - to watch the little world go by and observe the comings and goings at the pub, the school or the church.

It will be evident from the foregoing that the most used means of transport were the human legs. Baydon folks just walked!

They walked many miles each year, traversing the muddy or dusty roads and lanes, frequently using the many local bridle-ways and footpaths that afforded the shortest cuts.

The few who had the means rode around on horse-back farther afield and, of course, at a much faster rate. That this mode of transport had other advantages is borne out by the fact that a well-known worthy often relied on his mount to bring him back to the village after he had drunk strong liquor not wisely but too well.



Major transportation was carried out by various types of horse-drawn vehicles: gigs, traps, floats, carts, wagons and brakes. They carried both passengers and goods, averaging about 10 mph. When darkness fell two candle-lit lanterns, each in a socket on either side, strove pitifully to illumine the gloomy way. For believe it or not, street lighting came to Baydon only within the last decade*

But travel generally speaking, was only for those with the means and the time to spare. Few in Baydon had either. Small wonder that a cynic declared that rural England of those days was a 'Paradise for rich women, a purgatory for poor housewives and a hell for horses.'

Even a visit to Swindon or Newbury, unless one had private transport, cost more than the majority could afford. A trip to Swindon necessitated a walk over Peak Hill to where the Lottage Road joined Ermin Street, there to await the Carrier - appropriately named Mr Waite. Similar walking and waiting about, in all winds and weathers, had to be endured in order to get to other local towns.

It can thus be readily understood why quite a large proportion of Baydon folk rarely left the village; some hardly ever during the whole of their lives; and so a somewhat independent spirit grew up within the Parish.

By modern standards, both roads and vehicles were antiquated in construction and design. Ermin Street and Aldbourne Road were little better than tracks made from compacted flints broken up with sledgehammers by men called 'stone-crackers'. They were rutted and muddy in winter and thick with dust in summer. It was with considerable difficulty that gigs, carts and wagons made their way along them; and indeed, a great event when a steam-roller from Ramsbury appeared, in an attempt to iron out their more pronounced irregularities. But traffic was light. The busiest times were when local farmers were hauling mangolds, hay and corn, or driving cattle and sheep either to market or pastures new. For in those days farm workers drove livestock by road all the way to Swindon and other centres. Children played scare-interrupted games in the roads, often plastered by animal droppings as well as mud or dust. Villagers hailed one another unconcernedly in the middle of the road, and dogs, cats, ducks and hens wandered at will. 34

Flooding after heavy rain or snow melt has been occurring in a dip near Stokes, Hanks, Dennis premises, creating a significant driving hazard. The blocked gulley has been cleared and hopefully will avoid any repetition.

One last thing – dog mess is still a concern and worry for residents. Please do the proper thing when walking the dog! And please take your bags home and bin them. Thank you.

Wiltshire County Council's Waste Consultation

Your chance to have your say

Wiltshire Council is now responsible for collecting and disposing of household rubbish.

Before the unitary council came into being on April 1, 2009, rubbish was

collected by the four former district councils and the then county council disposed of it.

The move from five councils to one means the service is different across Wiltshire and needs to be standardised to ensure everyone has the same efficient, high quality service.

The council is facing tough recycling targets and the cost of landfill is due to double. Currently landfill costs are between £40 and £72 per ton -



Currently, the differing services, their costs and recycling rates are:

North - Household rubbish collected weekly, recycling fortnightly and fortnightly garden waste (charged) -average collection and disposal cost per property is £117.25. Recycling rate is 28%.

South - Household rubbish collected weekly, recycling (including plastic and cardboard) fortnightly and fortnightly garden waste (charged) – average collection and disposal cost per property is £136.06. Recycling rate is 35%.

East - Household rubbish collected fortnightly, recycling fortnightly and fortnightly garden waste (charged) - average collection and disposal cost per household is £97.97. Recycling rate is 45%.

West - Household rubbish collected fortnightly, recycling fortnightly and fortnightly garden waste (not charged) - average collection and disposal cost per household is £115.51. Recycling rate is 45%.

By popular demand, we're repeating the History of Baydon by Jack Naish which was serialised in Scene many moons ago. With oodles of thanks to Mo Lafford for collecting all of the editions together again

First a little about Jack:

Jack Naish: 1902 - 1995.

Jack and his wife Mary lived in Aldbourne Road, Baydon, for more than thirty years. A very respected and much loved 'gentle' gentleman, he had a wide knowledge of local people and village life, and was always ready to help anyone in need of assistance.

Jack retired from the Swindon Education Service in 1962, where he had done splendid work in the Adult and Youth Education field, giving much time and ability to development, especially of Youth Work, across the town.

He retired at sixty and, already keen on gardening, became very knowledgeable in horticulture, his advice often sought by individuals and the Parish Council. For many years he organised and ran the horticultural stall at the annual Garden Party (now Church and School fete). Both he and Mary were willing and happy participants in all aspects of village life.

Mary continued living in Baydon until her death a few years after Jack.

BAYDON CIRCA 1900 - A SERIAL HISTORY by the late R J NAISH JP

Undoubtedly the outstanding characteristics of life at the turn of the century, in a hill-top village like Baydon, was its comparative remoteness. Not that the village was cut off from surrounding population centres; it had regular supplies brought in by carriers, out-riders and other means. Newspapers, mail, medical and other services were available; except, of course, during those occasional winter periods when snow made approach roads impassable. Moreover, the local farmers, their wives and some of their men, went regularly to local markets. The more adventurous spirits attended fetes, flower shows and fairs during the summer and autumn. A few made infrequent visits further afield, travelling by rail from Lambourn, Swindon or Newbury. The fact remains, however, that the majority of Baydon folk stayed put. They had neither the means nor the time to travel.

And now for something really scrumptious

Juliet Keel from the fantastic Baydon WI has kindly proffered this recipe (which sounds absolutely delicious and I'm told is gorgeously moist but I can't make it because I'm on a diet). It's for:

Fruit Salad Cake

You'll need:

- 175 g (6 oz) roughly chopped dried fruit salad mixture or make up mix of dried apples, apricots, prunes, pears etc
- * 250 ml (8 fl oz) hot tea
- * 225 (8 oz) wholemeal SR flour
- ⋆ 5 ml (1 tsp) grated nutmeg
- * 50 g (2 oz) dark muscovado sugar
- ⋆ 45 ml (3 tbs) skimmed milk
- * 45 ml (3 tbs) sunflower oil
- Demerara sugar to sprinkle
- * Pinch salt



Method

- 1. Soak chopped dried fruit in hot tea for several hours or overnight; drain and reserve any liquid
- 2. Preheat oven to 180EC/350EF/Gas mark 4; grease a round 18 cm/7 in cake tin and line base with non-stick baking paper
- 3. Sift flour into bowl, stir in nutmeg, muscovado sugar, fruit, any remaining tea, oil and milk and mix well
- 4. Spoon mixture into prepared tin and sprinkle with demerara sugar. Bake for 50 55 minutes or until firm.
- 5. Turn out and cool on a wire rack





Bike Rides from Baydon

A new addition to Scene with oodles of thanks to Niall Cooling

Ride 03

Lambourn Loop Distance: 26Km Time: 1:30-2:00

This is a pleasant ride down into Lambourn and up onto the Lambourn Downs. The is a little more road time, but only navigating through

Lambourn itself.

Start/Finish: Start as usual at the village green, heading off towards Russley Park over the motorway bridge.

- Take the first right down towards Baydon Hole. Keep following this track past Baydon Hole and up a slight incline until you reach a bridleway crossroads.
- At the crossroads take the right hand track which will bring you down past Baydon Mowers at Farncombe Farm.
- Cross Baydon Road and carry on until the bridleway veers sharp right.
- Instead of following the path around to the right you are looking for a bridleway with a gate on your left (don't take the straight-ahead option either). Follow the track along the field, with the trees to your right.
- About ¾ of the way along you are looking for the bridleway to cross into the field on your right. The gate is easy to miss and if you reach the road you've missed it. Follow the bridleway until you reach the B4000. There is a track just down the road which you want to take. Cross the road with extreme care as the traffic comes around the bend far too quickly.
- Follow the track until you pick up the bridleway and head down into Lambourn. The bridleway will join up with Greenways and take you past the school down to Edwards Hill.
- Turn right into Edwards Hill and follow this down past Lambourn Sports Club (which turns into Bockhampton Road) until you reach the Tiunction.
- At the T-junction with Newbury Rd., turn right and then 1st left onto Long Hedge. The good news is that that's pretty much all the road work over with, the bad news is that Long Hedge is the longest climb of the ride.
- Follow the track around until you are back on tarmac and come to the crossroads with Sheepdrove Rd. Turn right here and follow the bridleway, the bridleway does split here so keep to the left-hand track.

- At the end of this track, turn left and follow the byway until you reach a barn.
- At the barn take the track (this is tarmac'ed as well so nice and easy) that is effectively straight-on. This track will take you all the way to the B4001 Wantage Road.
- At the B4001, turn left and follow the road for a short distance until you see byway to your right.
- Take the byway and follow it to the bottom of the hill (this is probably the best downhill bit, very fast and not too rutted).
- The byway will meet up with the seven-barrows road. Head straight on until road veers to the left. Don't continue on the road; instead carry straight on up the byway.
- At Hangman's Stone the byway is crossed by another, make sure you keep going straight. This will bring you down into Upper Lambourn.
- When you enter Upper Lambourn take a right (onto the High St.) and 1st left (mistake on map the Malt Shovel PH isn't quite here). This will bring you up to the B4000 (Lynchets View). Cross straight over the B4000 and up the byway onto Row Down.
- At the byway crossroads keep going straight.

This will then meet up with the Baydon Hole track. Take a right here and follow you nose back to Baydon.
