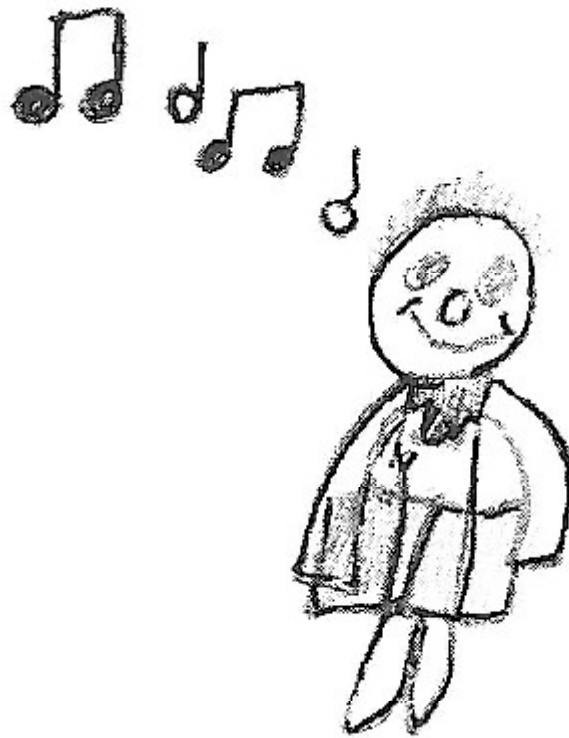

## Clergy Letter...

Canon Peter Ball writes ...  
... about an In-between Time

We have probably got several months ahead of us before a new Rector can be appointed to the Whitton Team. The time of an Interregnum without full-time clergy is both a time of problems and a time of opportunity.

There are problems particularly for the Churchwardens and other lay people responsible for leadership in the parishes. Together with the priests and lay ministers who make up our mainly part-time Staff Team, they have to cover all sorts of practical and administrative jobs which normally a Rector or Vicar would deal with. There are possibly going to be gaps and things that get missed. All sorts of adjustments may need to be made to established patterns. So, please, people need to be patient and understanding when there are difficulties.

On the other hand being short of ordained clergy is a real opportunity to take a look at what you believe the Church really is and what you think it is for. When I was ordained over fifty years ago, people still talked about ordination as "going into the Church". It was as though the Church meant the Clergy. Since those days there has been a revolution in thought. More and more, we have come to recognise that Church means the whole People of God. Priests are there to service the People of God. Their work is to lead and support the ministry which each member has in his or her ordinary life as a representative of Jesus in the world of today. As they say about village shops, so you can say about village churches, "If you want to keep it, use it!" The interregnum is a time for the people for whom the local church matters to find new ways of being responsible for it. May God bless us all in this task.

## **And from Tony Eyles...Considering 'Faith, Hope & Love'**

I wonder how many people feel that what goes on in church on a Sunday has become out of touch with normal life. For some, I feel there is a perceived barrier to going to a church service because of not knowing what to do, when to sit or stand, when to speak or keep silent. The parallel has been made with going into a betting shop – many of us wouldn't know what to do there either!

It's far less intimidating to meet informally in groups in one another's homes to consider and discuss aspects of the Christian faith. Here, everybody can be open to say what they really think, to raise queries or to share experiences. There's also the opportunity to make or deepen friendships.

We plan to arrange groups in each parish to meet five times during Lent (between Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> February and Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> April) to consider "Faith, Hope and Love". The basis is the 13<sup>th</sup> chapter of Paul's first letter to the Corinthians (often read at weddings). There will be a brief (recorded) introduction to each session from the Bishop of Durham - Tom Wright; the Abbot of Worth Abbey - Father Christopher Jamison and broadcaster and novelist - Anne Atkins. Course outlines, which include discussion-starting questions, are available.



These groups are open to all denominations and attendance at all sessions isn't compulsory! ## Comment

### Rural Communities & The Recession

The recently released report from the Commission for Rural Communities (CRC) on 'Recession Impacts on the Economies and Communities of Rural England' makes bleak reading. It states that 'communities and businesses across rural England face increasing deterioration – business closures, job losses, reduced working, lower consumer demand, and difficulty in securing bank funds. Bad news far outweighs the good'.

Closure of village amenities like shops, libraries, pubs, churches and schools cause many problems, not least this can drive house prices down. A village with amenities is obviously going to attract people more than one without. According to Estate Agents, without a local shop and amenities, house prices in a village can reduce as much as 5-10%. Some Estate Agents even sponsor local amenities' websites in an effort to keep them open and keep house prices up (and, therefore, estate agent's fees!)

In this first 'Comment' I'm seriously considering what Baydon would be like if our own village facilities become unprofitable, underused or defunct. If we want to keep our community, maintain some value in our houses and maintain Baydon's thriving centre, we have to use the shop, the Post Office, the pub, the church and so on. As Rev Peter Ball said earlier in Scene - use it or lose it.

## WILTSHIRE FIRE & RESCUE SERVICE

### CHIP AND FAT PAN FIRES IN THE HOME

When householders are confronted by a chip or fat pan fire in the Home they should **GET OUT, STAY OUT AND CALL THE FIRE & RESCUE SERVICE.**

The trend data from *Fire Statistics, UK* suggests that chip and fat pan fires are the biggest cause of accidental non-fatal casualties in dwelling fires. In 2006, there were 4,900 injuries in fires started by cooking appliances. This accounted for over half (53%) of non-fatal casualties in accidental dwelling fires and equates to 191 injuries per 1,000 fires relating to cooking appliances. Although the figure is decreasing in line with the national trend, the number of injuries is still significantly high enough to cause concern.

Statistics also show that many chip & fat pan fires are caused by late night cooking, particularly by men, under the influence of alcohol. 43% of chip pan casualties took place between 8pm & 4am, & more than 30% between 10pm & 4am.

Historically, the advice given by Government and the Fire and Rescue Service to those confronted by a chip or fat pan fire in the home was to tackle and extinguish the fire themselves. The method advised was to run a tea cloth under a tap, wring it out and then place the damp tea cloth over the rim of the pan.

However, being the most dangerous fire that householders are likely to face, As householders are not trained to properly deal with fires, they would potentially face severe injury or death if their attempts to extinguish fat or chip pan fires were unsuccessful. The wet tea towel advice is also contrary to all other advice we give to the general public about not tackling fires.

This issue has been debated at the CFA National Fire Prevention Committee. Although it was recognised that some people will continue to tackle chip and fat pan fires in the home, it was felt, on balance, that the best advice should be to '**get out, stay out and call 999**'. This would allow a trained firefighter, in appropriate protective clothing, to extinguish the fire more safely.

#### **The advice now given is:**

- > **Don't take any risks. Turn off the heat if it's safe to do so. Never throw water over it.**
- > **Don't tackle the fire yourself.**
- > **GET OUT STAY OUT AND CALL 999**

# Parish Council Corner

## BAYDON PARISH COUNCIL ACCESS TO PARISH FIELD POLICY

The Parish Council resolved on 29 September 2008 that no vehicles should be allowed on the Parish Field without prior authorisation from the Parish Council. This decision was followed by approval of the following policy on 12 January 2009:

The vehicles authorised as a matter of routine are as follows:-

1. Contractor vehicles used to maintain the Parish Field e.g. cut the grass and hedges, prune trees etc.
2. Delivery of manure for allotments.

When other vehicles are contracted by the Parish Council or the Clerk, under his/her Delegated Powers it will, by the process of contracting them, be deemed to include access authorisation.

If allotment holders require machinery for plot preparation they shall contact the Parish Council before hiring it. Alternatively, if machinery is required between Parish Council meetings then the Parish Clerk can make a decision under his/her Delegated Powers.

### **DISABLED ACCESS TO PARISH FIELD**

Notwithstanding the policy of not allowing vehicle access onto the Parish Field unless authorised by the Parish Council there is a need to define a policy for persons who are disabled.

Residents requiring vehicle access to transport a disabled person into the Parish Field need apply only once and frequency of access will have no relevance.

### Latest on Village Playground

There is a need to submit a proposal for a children's playground to Kennet District Council outlining the project in terms of location, equipment to be purchased, insurance etc. This proposal will form the basis of the request for the monies, put aside for recreational facilities as part of the Fiveways development, to be transferred to the Parish Council funds.

Three equipment suppliers have visited the village and quotations are being sent. Discussions are in progress about location and the insurance cover/health and safety aspects required by law. It will be necessary to obtain grants to fund some of the project

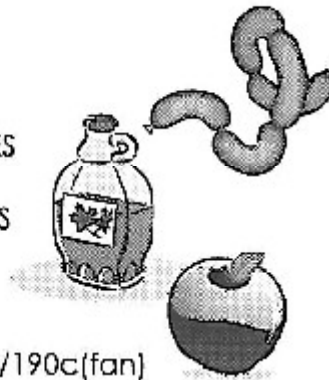

### Sticky Apple, Sausage & Bacon Roast with Maple Syrup

8 RASHERS SMOKED STREAKY BACON  
8 GOOD QUALITY PORK & HERB SAUSAGES  
1 TABLESPOON SUNFLOWER OIL  
2 RED-SKINNED APPLES, CUT INTO WEDGES  
1 TABLESPOON MAPLE SYRUP  
DRIED MIXED HERBS



- Pre-heat oven to gas mark 6/200c/190c(fan)
- Scratch the bacon rashers with the back of a knife and wrap around the sausages. Place in tin, add sunflower oil and roast for approximately 20 minutes.
- Add the apple wedges and maple syrup. Sprinkle with dried herbs and toss everything together, then continue roasting for another 10 minutes until the sausages are cooked and the apples caramelised.
- Eat, or cool for a picnic with salad.

# Focus On...

Where we focus on something of interest, someone or a group of folk in the village

There's no doubt about it, walking is good for you. It's good for your heart, it's good for your lungs, it's good for the muscle and bone growth of your children and it's good for your feeling of wellbeing! Strong scientific evidence now supports the many benefits to health of regular walking – it is recommended that we take at least 10,000 steps a day.

Studies show that walking can:

- Reduce the risk of coronary heart disease and stroke
- Lower blood pressure
- Reduce high cholesterol
- Reduce body fat
- Enhance mental well being



Walking offers a great way to help kids get the active habit. If parents express excitement about the prospect of a walk in the countryside, they are more likely to transmit this feeling to their children. It's important to treat the walk as an exploration or adventure and to go at the child's pace, no matter how often they want to stop and look at things; take treats to eat and plenty to drink; and head for some landmark that will appeal to them such as a castle, a playground, an ice cream van or a boating pond. If children experience walking as part of a fun activity they are more likely to want to go again.

So, how do you find out what is on offer?

Editor heard from John Harris, a keen walker, who got fed up with the lack of information on walks that were going on in the County. So, he decided that if he couldn't find what he was looking for – he had better create it!



John's wife and he are both walkers and when they were looking on the web for information about local walks, they found plenty of information BUT they had to look very hard to find it.

John is retired so thought that if he couldn't find the info he wanted, then others would be in the same boat. So perhaps he should set something up.

However, as John says "I didn't have the foggiest notion of how to set up a web site". Many books and hours of checking websites for information later, he set up the first county (Herefordshire – where he lives). It went well (400 visits a month) and so he went on to more counties and three years later managed to cover the whole country. John says "What constitutes 'going well' has changed a bit since 2005 – this month will see 100,000 visits!"

"The web sites make a little money over the costs of running them but the satisfaction of producing a resource which is so widely used is a goal in itself."

So <http://www.walkinginwiltshire.org.uk> came into being.

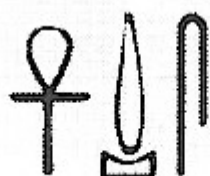

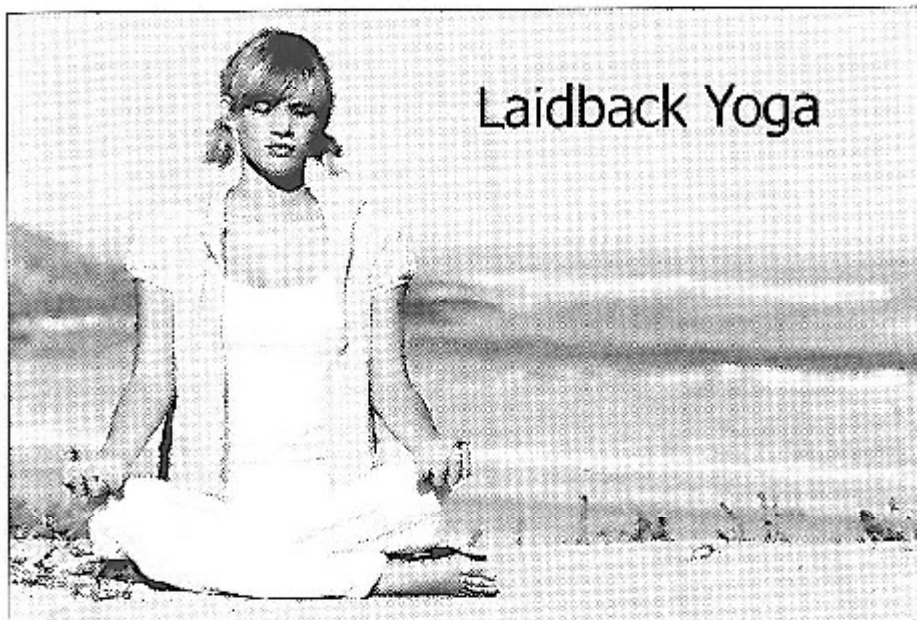

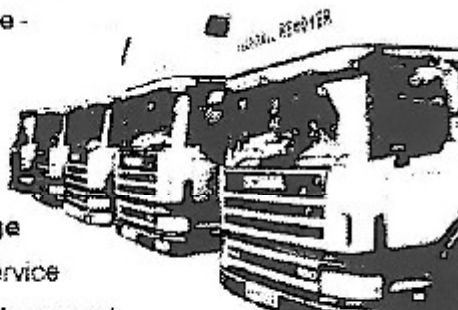
