Clergy letter...

I've been watching with some interest the launch of the Action for Happiness movement reported by the BBC on 12th April.

I quote what the movement says in the BBC article, 'Despite massive material progress, people in Britain



and the US are no happier than they were 50 years ago, while there are many societies in which people are much happier than in Britain.' They reject a societal focus on materialism and self-obsessed individualism and prioritise healthy relationships and meaningful activities as a means to happier living.

It professes to have no commercial, political or religious affiliations, (except for the support of the Dalai Lama). It gives 'advice for happier living, such as to do things for others; keep learning things; be comfortable with who you are; and connect with people.' I suppose most of us can go along with those objectives but as a Christian I would like to add one or two things that Christians find helpful.

Firstly, it's very important to find some time in the day just 'to be'. This may be a time of reflection or prayer or just a time of quiet peace away from the pressures of life. We try to count our blessings, bring others to God in prayer, examine the things we regret and seek help in times of pressure, trouble, sorrow or distress of any kind. Sometimes we have no words at all but just drink in peace and try to form positive attitudes to things that are distressing us. It's remarkable in this time how we suddenly realise where we are being unreasonable. We ask for guidance that we may reflect God's will and not just our own and we seek his forgiveness and help.

I applaud any initiative to make people happier and pray that God will bless the efforts of all who try to help others.



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

Parish Field Damage – what is the point?

On Tuesday 17th April there was an incident on the Parish Field involving a number of local boys. In addition there was an act of mindless vandalism which involved pulling plastic posts out of the ground and breaking three of them into small pieces. The posts have been - and will continue to be replaced - if there is any repetition. The cost of damage can only be reflected in an increase in the precept which affects every household in the village.

There are witnesses and the police have been informed. Further action will be taken if this unacceptable behaviour does not stop. You know who you are, and so does the Parish Council, so please start acting responsibly and respect equipment and other people.

Please explain to all children using the Parish Field that access is only via the track. There have been some frightening experiences witnessed recently with unaccompanied children using the bank next to Ermin Street as a short cut. Ermin Street is a notoriously busy road and it can never be safe to climb up the adjacent bank, access to the Parish Field is via the track and the gate only.

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Marlborough Area Board - Library Review Feedback

The Library service Review: approved by Wiltshire Council Cabinet Jan 2011

The Wiltshire library offer from 1 September 2011:

The library service will be able to keep all libraries open.



Chairman Councillor Chris Humphries

- 21 council operated libraries with rationalised core opening hours.
- All 5 mobiles libraries will continue to operate, including the homes mobile.
- 10 libraries operated in partnership with the community providing opportunities for local community volunteers, working in partnership with Wiltshire library staff.
- Opportunities for volunteers to extend the opening hours at other libraries.
- Investment in Radio Frequency Identification (R.F.I.D.) self service technology.

Marlborough Area Library Services from 1 September 2011:

- All mobile library stops will continue to operate.
- Marlborough library opening hours will be reduced from 42.5 to 33 hours a week.
- Ramsbury which is amongst Wiltshire's 10 smallest libraries, accounting for 3% of visits overall, would be operated in partnership with volunteers, and supported by the library service.
- Aldbourne Library is currently under discussion with possible precept raising by its Parish Council to fund it.
- New self service technology will be introduced to all libraries.
- The Contactpoint service at Marlborough Library will cease.

WILTSHIRE AIR AMBULANCE APPEAL



Wiltshire's Air Ambulance was established in April 1990 as a joint venture between the Wiltshire Ambulance Service and Wiltshire Police. **Wiltshire Air Ambulance Appeal** which is a registered charity.

Everyone in Wiltshire has a stake in the Wiltshire Air Ambulance. It is an essential service that serves the people of Wiltshire what ever your age or gender. We are there for those life and death situations where the speed of the helicopter and the skill of the crew play a major part in the outcome of the patient.

WAA can be at an incident with - in 11 minutes. You may have heard the phrase 'Golden Hour' – this is used to describe the hour directly after an incident has taken place. It is imperative that the injured party receive medical attention within this hour to **minimize** the risk of life changing injuries or in some cases death.

Almost half of all incidents the Air Ambulance attends are Road Traffic Collisions across our county roads or on the Motorways. Other situations include, cardiac arrests, horse riding accidents, work related injury, sporting injuries, farm accidents, fires and burns. No two day are ever the same.

We are entirely dependent on public support having to raise over £700,000 each year to cover the running costs. We do not receive government funding but totally rely on the generosity of people of Wiltshire.

We are able to fly 19 hours a day, 365 days of the year.

But.....Without you, we would be grounded.

They often lived in the shadow of poverty and fear, but they had, as we have noted, their fun and humour too, chaffing one another as they went on their daily rounds. 'I shan't let X make my coffin,' said one worthy,

'cause there'll be too many chinks to peep through, and I shall know who's followin' be'ind.'

These were folk who moved, in the words of Thomas Gray, 'Along the cool sequester'd vale of life' at a time when London - by then the social and political hub of the world - glittered under gas-light chandeliers and the British Monarch and the Czar of Russia reigned over half the world. But they had an ordered, predictable existence in a setting that had really altered little for hundreds of years. They occupied a minute but clearly definable space in the social order, and accepted it with equanimity. They knew where they stood, and their background seemed as permanent as the local downs.

World War 1 came upon them out of the blue; its rumblings were unmistakable and ominous. It marked a watershed in rural English life and when those gallant, saddened young survivors returned to their Baydon homes from Flanders fields, it was to find that life could never be the same again.

THE END

'Baydon Circa 1900' by R J Naish, was originally published in The Aldbourne and Baydon Parish Magazine in 1974, and in the Scene in Baydon over five issues commencing October 2000.

"The Drummond Will"

A special showing of the film "The Drummond Will" was seen in Baydon St. Nicholas School hall on 13th May. The full-length film was made on location in and around Baydon in 2009 and one of the scriptwriters was our very own Sam Forster from Baydon Hole.

Since completion the Drummond Will has won five "Audience Favourite" awards around the world. The hall was packed with a very appreciative audience for the showing. A very funny and well-scripted film, was the verdict. Tickets were free but donations of around £200 were collected for the Church Roof Fund They kept an amazing assortment of goods, stored under conditions that would appal health inspectors today but this was the only possible and practicable means of business, in those times.

As one entered the shops, one was assailed by a notunpleasant smell, compounded of many ingredients. Cheese and butter reposed on open slabs on the counter; sugar, flour, various grains and powders were served from sacks with scoops on to all-purpose scales; tea was extracted from large chests; the packaging of sweets and chocolates and

other comestibles was almost unknown. These shops were ill-lit and feebly heated by oil lamps and stoves, which added their particular tang to the all-pervading odour. The shop keepers worked hard and long for very little profit. By their compassion and trust they were often the victims of bad debts. They contributed considerably to the communal life of the village.

The growth of towns and cities, with their increasing industrialisation and remarkable inventive developments, touching almost every aspect of daily life, had been the outstanding feature of our twentieth century existence. Yet there are many who still believe that the best of England has been, and always will be, life in rural communities: that the truly most contented people were (and still are) those who have lived simple and comparatively uneventful lives amongst the beautiful English countryside - life so quiet, so unexciting, so unsensational, so serenely busy in unobtrusive workaday affairs, so little recorded, that posterity is hardly privileged to hear about it.

A record of some of these very mundane, ordinary, everyday matters has been attempted in these chronicles, which have been contributed entirely from memories of a number of older local residents. No attempt at a documented or deeply researched monograph has been made; and memory, the fickle faculty that it is, may have faulted at times or been guilty of omissions. If so, it is sincerely hoped that neither hurt nor offence has been committed.

BAYDON CIRCA 1900 - A SERIAL HISTORY

by the late **R** J NAISH JP Final Episode - Vital Services and Jack's Summary

By popular demand, we're repeating the History of Baydon by Jack Naish which was serialised in Scene many moons ago. With oodles of thanks to Mo Lafford for collecting all of the editions together again.

Carriers transported heavy goods to and from the village either by private arrangement or by making routine calls at the Forge, run by



those adaptable handy-men, Bert and Bill Aldridge. Charges for goods and transport were extremely low. In 1916, for example, the School Managers gave favourable consideration to an estimate of thirty shillings for the supply and delivery of 'a harmonium, two blackboards, a

door and a cupboard'.

Medical attention was available to Baydon from single private practitioners living in the larger communities. They came up either on horse back or in gig or trap, very smart these outfits were, too, and a cause for considerable professional pride. It is said that one doctor from the adjoining county sometimes drove a sleigh to visit his rural patients when snow was deep.

Newspaper and mail came to the village daily. Both were collected from Lambourn Station off the twelve o'clock train from Newbury. The postman, Johnny Wakefield, walked daily from Aldbourne to Lambourn and back, via Baydon, to collect and distribute letters and small parcels on his way, cheerful and uncomplaining about fatigue and the hardships of his job.

It was possible for men to get a haircut without going to town; a Mr Lawrence cut men's hair for 2d (boys' a penny) in his cottage room. In failing light he held a candle cautiously in one hand and snipped away with the other. It is not recorded whether 'singeing' was included or not.

Whilst attempting to chronicle some of the services available, one must not forget the contributions of those who, at various times, ran the village shops: Miss Ann Alder, Miss Louise Everett, Mrs Palmer, Charles Alder and others.

And now for something really scrumptious!

According to Barbara, it's perfect early summer jelly using gooseberries and elderflowers that are about to come into season. Gooseberry & Elderflower Jelly

1lb (450 g) Gooseberries	4 oz (110g) Sugar
2 x 4 oz (11g) Sachets of Gelatine	4 tbsp Elderflower Cordial
12 fl oz Sparkling Wine	

Method

- 1. Top and tail the gooseberries
- 2. Sprinkle sugar & place on gentle heat – soften for 5 – 6 minutes. Stirring occasionally.
- 3. Soak gelatine in a cup with 3 tbsp water
- 4. Stir in gooseberries slowly so as not to break fruit too much. Cool
- 5. After 45 minutes stir in elderflower cordial and wine.



- 6. Mix thoroughly and pour into 7 fl oz wine glasses.
- 7. Cover with cling film and chill.
- 8. Serve with cream or fromage frais and a sprig of mint or elderflower!

Gardening this Summer!

Well, here it is: the longest day of the year, 21st June. And this means long hours in the evenings to sit back in our gardens, relax and enjoy all our hard work. But, if you're anything like me, you'll always find stuff to do. Here are some of the never-ending jobs that need tackling:

- Keep on cutting your lawn. This is the number 1 job you can do to keep your garden looking neat and tidy. Some of the grass can be looking quite dry right now, a sign of the little rain we've had in April and May. But do keep it trim and a crisp edge will give it that professional look.

- Watering pots and hanging baskets is also a priority over the summer. Now, whether or not you believe in Climate Change, water is precious and scarce and we all have a duty to harvest as much water as we can. So use water butts and other containers specifically for watering outdoors. Personally I think sprinklers are a definite no-no as they waste so much.

- Regularly go round the garden and stake any tall and delicate plants, such as hollyhocks. Don't wait til it's too late and winds and rain have beaten them down. Tie them up, fairly loosely to allow them growing room, as soon as you see the need.



- Protect fruit trees from birds. You could hang unwanted CDs in trees to scare them off - or if small enough, you could try netting the trees too!

- As always: weed whenever you can. It's up to you how much time and effort you put into this job, but at the very least please try and hoe the weeds off before the seeds spread. It's not always necessary to get the roots out, if you haven't got the time and energy - hoeing will at least keep the weeds in check!

- Watch out for crop infestations, be this from greenfly or slugs and snails. If at all possible, use natural methods to combat pests. Ladybirds, for example, thrive on greenfly; hedgehogs love slugs; frogs and toads love little flies! We all have our favourite snacks...

And if it's raining? Check out recordings of Chelsea this year and be inspired. Wasn't it amazing? And my personal favourite was the garden which re-used every single drop of water that landed within its reach. We certainly need to learn from this!
