Clergy letter...

Dear All

'Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness' Keats.

Despite the severe winter, prolonged snowfall and ice, this year has produced a bumper crop of fruit. My apple tree, which has been fruitless for years, has been laden. I also had a wonderful crop of loganberries, strawberries, blackberries and rhubarb – the best in years! Judging from the wheelbarrows I've seen returning from the allotments I'm not alone. I love seeing these wheelbarrows because the people wheeling them aren't just



benefitting from what they grow. They've become a community of friends with a fulfilling purpose in life.

If we read John's gospel in the bible, we find that Jesus is telling us to 'go and bear fruit – fruit that will last'. Just how are we to do that? In the very next verse it tells us where to begin. Jesus says, "This is my command: Love each other".

It isn't always easy to love each other. We're all human and fall into all kinds of regrettable situations where we find it hard to love ourselves, never mind loving others. However we all have the power of will and, with determination, it's surprising what we can do especially if we pray for help on the way.

If we want our lives to be fruitful, it might be good to look at the fruit around us. First of all we have to plant seeds. They won't all grow but with a little watering and care the shoots will begin to flourish. Giving care and offering friendship is a bit like that. Sometimes we have to be prepared to spend a little money to improve the soil or add a little fertiliser to quicken the process. That's a bit like our charitable giving. If everyone gave a few pounds we would halve the devastation of tragedies in no time. And so on.

But in all this let us thank God for all the fruit we enjoy in our lives. How blessed we are to live in such a lovely place surrounded by good things and good people.

I wish you all a happy season of mists and mellow fruitfulness.

Sunday 31st October 2010 at 4pm

Each year we hold a service to remember those who have died and give thanks to God for all that they have meant and continue to mean to us. This year the service takes place at Holy Cross, Ramsbury on Sunday 31st October at 4pm and will be followed by a cup of tea for those who would like to stay on.



There's an auction in the school, the Christmas Fayre and an everpopular Quiz Night through November to look forward to. More information on notice boards, on the website and in Scene.





Next months meeting will be a Card Workshop, presented by Mrs Maureen Jepson.


BAYDON THURSDAY CLUB



Marlborough Area Board Meets in lockeridge

31 August 2010



Chairman, Cllr Chris Humphries, welcomed 43 people to the meeting in Kennet Valley Hall, Lockeridge on 31 August. The main focus was 'community issues'. Discussions included:

George Lane, Marlborough- request for 'Puffin' crossing

Chairman Councillor Chris Humphries

• A presentation on the proposed 'Great Stones Way' walk from Avebury to Stonehenge, which would attract more visitors to the area and boost the local economy. Further information is available at www.ridgewayfriends.org.uk

- An update on the works at Pewsey Road Bridge. The future works programme was being reviewed to see if there would be scope to open the bridge for the Christmas trading period.
- A proposal from the area board task group for a £5,000 funding allocation for youth transport/access. It was decided to pilot provision of free minibus transport to three activities
- A brief presentation on the review of leisure facilities across Wiltshire and the impact on Marlborough. Marlborough Leisure Centre is in the programme for improvements and refurbishment.

Grants awarded!

The Marlborough Area Board exists to make things better in the area and part of their work is to allocate funding to local projects.

Aldbourne Parish Council applied to the area board and was awarded £773 towards the upgrade of an important footpath, improving access for all to the play area and village green.

Marlborough Apple Day Festival was awarded £709 to raise awareness of local apple varieties and orchard habitats and to launch a community orchard.

Ramsbury Allotment Association was awarded **£697** towards the costs of a water standpipe on the condition that the allotment holders each contributed £5 towards the costs.

This year £17,888 has been allocated to 11 projects thus far. There is £39,481 remaining to be spent by March 2011.

Funding is available to help provide facilities, equipment and activities that are important to the local community. These awards can really make a big difference in helping communities get schemes and projects started. Applications are now invited - to find out more about the funding criteria please visit: www.wiltshire.gov.uk/areaboards





At Band of Hope meetings, heart-rending songs and poems dealt emotionally with the wickednesses and sorrows resulting from strong drink. Well meaning persons came to the village from time to time; standing outside the School, they often got children to 'sign the pledge' long before they fully understood what it was all about.

On Sunday evenings in particular, the less indulgent drinkers often set out along Ermin Street with their wives and families. There were no fewer than five inns within walking distance: The Red Lion, The Plough, The Chalkers, The Brickmakers' Arms and the Hare and Hounds. Only a few miles on, the Pheasant opened its doors to the more determined travellers. They enjoyed the company, meeting fresh people. Parents drank their ale, cider and porter, whilst children played around outside, fortified now and then by a large sweetmeal biscuit and a swig of ginger beer. In these simple hostelries they roistered modestly before returning home to bed and the unwelcome thought of another week of toil.

It has already been said that the local farmers were the biggest employers of labour during the period of our survey. In the days before much mechanisation each farmer required three or four times the number of men needed to run a farm today.

Most farm buildings were rickety, draughty wooden sheds; indoor accommodation for animals was primitive and there was scant respect of consideration for matters of hygiene. Outside the yards were deep in mud and dung.



Each cow was milked by hand, the milker perched on a small stool with head against the animal's flank. Milk pails were far from sterile, hands of the milkers sometimes dirty and the health of many cows suspect. After running through the cooler the milk was poured into churns and, unless sold on a local milk-round, taken to a depot. The price - sixpence a gallon!

BAYDON CIRCA 1900 - A SERIAL HISTORY by the late R J NAISH JP Episode 5 - Church & Farming

By popular demand, we're repeating the History of Baydon by Jack Naish which was serialised in Scene many moons ago. With oodles of thanks to Mo Lafford for collecting all of the editions together again.

At this time the Methodists were on the up-surge. They worshipped in their Chapel - which is now the converted cottage in Ermin Street, known as 'Chapel Cottage'. Here a number of village 'characters' met regularly to sing praises to the Almighty with evangelical enthusiasm. Among these were William Radbourne, whose daughter Alice taught at the school, William Marchant, a forbidding stocky figure with a long black beard, Thomas Peck, William Hayes and Fred Lawrence, a consistent apponent of

the Established Church, a prominent Liberal and organiser of the sports at the Baydon Annual Flower Show. There was also Walter Scott, the village roadman, who kept the verges much tidier than they are today, and his wife Ellen, who was a Superintendent of the Sunday School and played the harmonium with one finger.



Here a service would sometimes be taken by Stephen Woodley, a pious man and convincing

preacher. His lack of schooling would sometimes display itself as he read a Lesson, for he would pause and say 'Big word, pass on!!'

The Methodist Anniversary services were great occasions and ran on well into the ensuing week. They were held in the barn at Waldron's Farm, then owned by Mr Pembroke. Farmer Waldron, the former owner, was a Ramsbury man who sent several local shepherds in a windjammer to the Falkland Islands to develop the sheep-rearing industry there. Two Baydon men, Tom Barnes and Harry Barrett went out there for a time, experiencing all kinds of hardships and privations during their stay.

The two village pubs, The Red Lion and The Plough, also played an important part in the social life of the adult villagers. Some men visited their 'regular' nightly and were great drinkers. Beer was strong in those days and cost 1d a pint. As long as some men had a penny so they drank and were often carried home, helplessly drunk, much to their wives' despair and families' detriment. This situation, which was pretty general in England at this time, gave strength to the Band of Hope and Rechabite movement.



This edition, Barbara Furber has supplied a recipe that's delicious with soup on bonfire night and quick and easy to bake.

Cheesey Corn Triangles

You'll need: Method

100g Plain Flour1 tbsp Baking Powder2 Eggs (beaten)100g SweetcornSalt & Black Pepper

100g Semolina 100ml Milk 50g Butter 100g Grated Cheese

Set the oven to 180°C / 350°F / Gas Mark 4 Lightly grease an 18cm square cake tin.



- 1. Mix the flour, semolina and baking powder together in a big bowl.
- 2. Beat the milk and eggs together in a separate bowl.
- 3. Gently melt the butter in a small saucepan.
- 4. Add the sweetcorn and cheese to the flour mixture, then pour in the eggy mixture and add the butter.
- 5. Give the ingredients in the bowl a good stir to mix them thoroughly. Season
- 6. Spoon the mixture into the tin.
- 7. Smooth the top and bake for 20 minutes until golden brown and springy to touch.
- 8. Cut into triangles and serve straight away.

Little Crickets Pre-School are still in celebration of their achievement of another OUTSTANDING inspection for the 2nd time.

"It's so fantastic, as we achieved an outstanding in 2007, so to achieve this all over again is a real WOW factor" said Denise.

Our achievement couldn't have happened without the enthusiastic, dedicating members of the staff team and the support from the trustees and parents. We have also passed our first year, with flying colours, a Bristol Standards Qualification. This is an accreditation award, for our practice to always improve on what we are doing. This is quite a challenge and is ongoing for 3yrs.

We have to work harder than most settings, as having to set up and pack away in a hall, can be very limiting. We always make sure that the children have all availability and access to all the toys.

Our children have lots of fun through play, while learning at the same time. We cover a weekly topic, having a shape, colour, number and phonic letter sound, that the children go through each day.

Each child achieves at their own pace and are always encouraged, at all times. By the time they leave pre-school, they have become confident and independent for their journey up to primary school exciting and challenging. In July we said goodbye to 14 children, ending the term with a concert of the Little Mermaid. All our leavers were then presented with

books.

The pre-school is run by 6 trustees and is a charity organisation.

We have many fundraising events throughout the year. This enables us to buy new equipment for the children. Our next fundraiser is on Bonfire night, when we join up with Baydon Brownies, selling hotdogs, soup and drinks, so see you there.



We make the most of our outdoor garden environment, whatever the weather. You may have seen us out in our brightly coloured jackets, when on our walks, around the village.
