

All Souls Service of Remembrance and Thanksgiving

Dear All

A huge amount of activity is going on in Ramsbury church circles at the moment in readiness to celebrate the 1100 years since Ramsbury became a Bishopric and Athelstan was consecrated as its first Bishop in 909. On the 12th September the English Chamber Choir Concert performed a memorable programme at 7.30 pm in Holy Cross Church and on the 13th

September there was a service of celebration with a number of past Bishops of Ramsbury present and of course the current Bishop Bishop Stephen. The Bishop of Salisbury too preached. The children paraded down the High Street in Saxon costume and during the service they toured the church with Bishop Stephen to hear various parts of its history being explained to them as they went.



This was all rounded off with Hog Roast and entertainment on Back Lane Field after the service. So, why are we doing it, why celebrate?

Well, despite the sense of history that provokes celebration there is a much deeper experience for those who worship in Holy Cross to commemorate. It is the connection with the early Christian community in this country; the spiritual continuity from generation to generation of Christians. The church has seen times of hardship, plague, war, poverty, richness, oppression and it has sailed through them all being a steadfast source of spiritual hope to those who sought communion with God. The building itself holds centuries of history and each bit of that history contributes to making the church that we have today a place for peace, prayer and meditation and, above all a place to be still with God. On Sundays it is a place of corporate worship where the congregation join together and praise the Lord as one body - young and old.

Countless people in the last 1100 years have gained strength and hope to cope with the circumstances they find themselves in by spending time in this church. It is a visible reminder of the Christian hope that Christ conquers all, even death, and that nothing at all can separate us from His love and protection. To move inside and sit in Holy Cross and let God's love enfold you is the best medicine of all to remove the stress that the day to day hustle and bustle of everyday life creates. Come, sit and be still and experience it for yourselves.

It is something to celebrate indeed! It is timeless!



We have official planning permission granted for the works on the school now!



P.C. Jeremy Batchelor (Batch) and PSO John Mills were at the BYPA Hall at a well attended meeting. The main points were:

- Occasionally illegal immigrants could be found wandering in the village, as Membury Services are the first stop for trucks bringing them in. They pose no threat and are usually picked up by the police and taken to Swindon. Undesirables are very quickly sent back, children under 15 are sent to a centre.
- The village is being used as a drugs drop off from Reading. The main dealer has been imprisoned but his son has been spotted visiting the Red Lion car park. If you notice anything suspicious phone the police. 999 is the number to call if a crime is being committed. For minor issues or advice - phone 0845 408 7000, text or e-mail the local police team.
- The main issue of speeding in the village was discussed including physical obstacles such as a chicane and the parking problems during school hours. PC Batchelor said that he would ensure there was more police presence during that period to talk to parents.
- It was explained that Baydon was a speeding Community Concern site. It had the right to put up camera signs and be visited by the police camera van. If Baydon wished to claim Community Speed Watch status instead, it would lose the camera van visits
- The 30mph labels for bins may have to be changed to triangular (warning)
- A greater police presence was requested for the village particularly for the sake of the children. Batch replied that it was up to the village to direct the force to specific needs. It was also suggested that the school children come and visit the Marlborough Police Station



And now for something really scrumptious!..

Another scrummy recipe courtesy of our WI Group. This time, Pat Thompson came up with this bonfire treat. My Grandmother used to make Parkin - I haven't had it for years and it's proper Bonfire-y!

Bonfire Night Parkin

You'll need: 100g butter 100g black treacle 200g golden syrup 100g muscavado sugar 200g s.r. flour 2tsp ground ginger 1/2tsp ground cinnamon 1tsp bicarbonate of soda 100g coarse oatmeal 1 egg 6 tbs milk



Heat oven to 150C. Grease & line 20cm square cake tin. Heat butter, treacle, syrup & sugar over a low heat until all melted together, and allow to cool slightly.

Sieve flour with the ginger, cinnamon and bicarbonate of soda, and stir in the oatmeal. Make a well in the centre and gradually add the cooled syrup mixture, stirring so it doesn't become lumpy. Stir in the egg and milk to make a thick batter. Pour into the prepared tin and cook for 1-1¼ hours until just firm. Leave in the tin to cool completely, (it will sink a bit in the middle), and cut into pieces. Store in an airtight tin for up to a week. It actually tastes better if made a couple of days in advance.

Not content with filling you full of delicious parkin! Here's another gorgeous and really easy recipe courtesy of Barbara Furber

At this time of year it is difficult to know what to do with all those large Courgettes from the garden.

Here is an excellent recipe to solve that problem.

The cake is dark, moist, nutty and moreish. The mixture is sufficient for 2 X 2lb loaf tins - I usually freeze one for later

Scrummy Courgette Cake

You'll need:

3 Eggs 275ml Oil 350g Soft brown sugar 350g Courgette - grated 165g Plain flour 165g Buckwheat flour Baking powder 1 tsp 2 tsp Bi-carb



1 tsp Ground cinnamon

175g Raisins

Walnuts (chopped) OR sunflower seeds OR mixed 150g chopped nuts

METHOD:

Mix ingredients and bake for 1 hour approximately at 180°C -350°F - Gas 4


A new addition to Scene with oodles of thanks to Niall Cooling

Ride 1 Distance: 8.5km Difficulty: Easy, but rutted in places Time: 40-60 mins.

- Starting from the green in Baydon head out towards Russley ්ර Park
- After crossing the motorway bridge take the 2nd right towards **Bailey Hill Farm**
- Head down passed the farm and then up the track to the 40 top of Bailey Hill
- There is a great downhill here but mind the ruts as they can 46 throw you off the bike
- At the bottom of the hill follow the bridleway right đh
- At the end of this short piece of bridleway you'll pass through a gate and come to a crossroads.
- At the crossroads again take the track to the right ഷ്ട
- This track will take you up onto the Gallops this is a bit of a ්ර climb
- Once heading downhill after the Gallops look for a track to di. the right that will take you towards Baydon Hole
- Make this track and at the bottom again take a right be careful here as it can be very loose and easy to lose your front wheel
- Hollow the track up past Baydon Hole.
- Mon The track will turn back into a tarmac road.
- This road will join back up with the Russley Park road. 46
- Take a left back over the motorway bridge to arrive back in ർർ Baydon.

Note: this route can be ridden anti-clockwise as a harder ride as the climb up Bailey Hill is a tough one! - can you make it to the top without getting off?

Flu & Swine Flu Update

Flu clinics are due to start in the week commencing Monday 19th October. Appointments will be taken as soon as we receive the vaccines. This is expected to be in the week commencing 12th October.

"At Risk" groups are people who suffer with:

- Ischaemic Heart Disease
- Diabetes
- Chronic Kidney Disease
- Chronic Liver Disease
- Chronic Chest Conditions, including asthma
- Aged 65 or over ۲

The Government has confirmed that the swine flu vaccine will be made available via Primary Care over the next couple of months. As yet we have no date as to when the vaccines will arrive but we will keep you updated.

The clinical "At Risk" groups are:

- Individuals aged between six months and up to 65 years in the current seasonal flu vaccine clinical At Risk groups as above All pregnant women, subject to licensing conditions on which is
- the appropriate trimester to administer the vaccine
- Household contacts of immuno-compromised individuals People aged 65 and over in the current seasonal flu vaccine clinical at-risk groups

Frontline health and social care workers will be offered the vaccine at the same time as the first clinical At Risk groups.

It leaves Baydon (end of Downsmead) at 10.20am (new time) and leaves Newbury at 1.40pm for the return journey.

It may not be as quick, or follow such a direct route, as in the car but it certainly beats finding a place to park - and of course it is free for those over sixty (providing you have your bus pass).

Sparkling Final Effluent (from Baydon)

You may have noticed the heavy vehicle activity leading off the lower end of Manor Lane earlier this year.

The Thames Water Board has been busy improving our sewage works. They have been quick to assure us that the existing system was very adequate and processed the water to the required standard.



However the site lent itself to a new "polishing" plant. A reed bed has been installed to bring the treated water to a higher standard - a sparkling final effluent that will soak away into the water table below. The existing plant will continue its

work, but then will pass the water into the reed bed.


This was felt to be the best option because it requires no power and little or no maintenance.

Once the reeds are fully established they hopefully will become a haven for wildlife, birds and insects etc. as well as providing cleaner water.

This improvement is not being introduced everywhere so Baydon is very fortunate.


The lorries may have been an inconvenience for a time, but I am sure you will be pleased to hear that Thames Water are striving to improve our environment.


